Lesson plan 19:30 Welcome, 19:40 Revision of yes/no questions and answers, 20:00 Simple story, 20:30 Chat (in English, with a little Cornish thrown in) about Cornish language and culture

YES/NO QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS (revision, possibly with a few things that are new)

A yes/no question is one that expects the answer yes or no. In Cornish, as in English, the verb comes first in such a question. For the verb ‘to be’, the verb is the very first word of all (without **yth** that only appears in positive statements). For other verbs the particle **a** is the first word, followed immediately by the verb itself. The verb mutates after particle **a** into Second State. Particle **a** itself is often omitted in rapid speech.

To answer ‘yes’ we say **eâ**. To answer ‘no’ we say **nâ**. There is a more formal way that involves repeating the verb (rather like saying ‘I do’ when getting married). You can find out how to use the more formal response from your coursebook.

‘Not’ in a negative statement is **nyns** in front of the verb when you’re using the verb ‘to be’.

Question	Answer (first short, then long)
Osta sqwith?	Eâ. or Nâ. Eâ, me yw sqwith. or Nâ, nyns ov vy sqwith.
Esta owth eva coffy?	Eâ. or Nâ. Eâ, yth esof vy owth eva coffy. or Nâ, nyns esof vy owth eva coffy.

Remember that we write formal Cornish to show all the grammar. In rapid speech things simplify quite a lot. This is typical of Celtic languages. Until you are confident, it will be best to pronounce every syllable. Later you will find you can go quicker. So **yth esof vy owth eva coffy**, for example, can be reduced to **th'eso'vy h'eva coffy**.

SIMPLE STORY

In preparation for the lesson, check the revision grammar above, then read the story quietly until you think you've got the hang of it. Use the Vocabulary at the back of the coursebook to look up words. Read the story aloud as well, to practise your pronunciation.
