#### Vice Chairman's Jottings

#### Hands on sessions (DRAFT)

For the benefit of those who didn't attend the recent AGM and as a reminder for those who did, one of the topics raised during the AOB item was that there hadn't been any hands-on sessions of late. In response it was stated that where hands on facilities had been laid on, there had been little or no take up. I do not want to Bob Packer speculate on the reason behind this here, rather



as there seems to be a genuine interest for sessions to cover pyrography as an example, I would like to propose the following which puts the onus on the club members to suggest ideas for hands-on sessions.

At the AGM, Colin Grundy volunteered to act as co-ordinator for these events. It is proposed that the sessions will be held at the workshop rather that one of the other venues (Walsgrave for example). This has the advantage that if workshop equipment is needed for the session then they are at hand and there is no hire cost for the room.

The process that is envisaged is as follows:

A member or members contact Colin (preferably via email) for a particular hands-on session, e.g. pyrography or tool sharpening etc.

A list of these requests will be published in the club magazine, along with requests for individuals to act as tutors.

When a suitable number (depending on the session) have registered interest and a tutor has come forward a date for the session will be arranged and communicated along with any joining instructions to those who registered for the session. Current thinking is that these sessions will run on either Mondays or Thursdays.

Should a session be over subscribed then the club will endeavour to organise a repeat session.

This process is offered to the membership on a trial basis. It is hoped that members will come forward with their ideas and support these sessions. A session may require the participants to provide their own material, bring their own tools or equipment, protective clothing, etc. Also, where the session provider supplies material for example, then they will need to be reimbursed. These details will be included in the joining instructions. The club magazine will be the primary channel used to promulgate information regarding sessions rather than the web site as not all members have access to the internet.



<u>Matters Arising from Minutes of AGM held on 06.01.2018</u>: There were no matters arising.

Chairman's Report: The past year as a whole could have been better. Support from members at the Daffodil Festival, Monks Kirby was low and the attendance at the Summer Fayre was poor due to Football World Cup matches held that day. However, the sale of raffle tickets was very successful. Sales at the Godiva Festival, Coventry were badly affected due to the positioning of the Green Tent which was away from the mainstream of visitors. A new organiser had taken over the planning and was not familiar with the layout of the site. The organisers have promised the Club this year, the Green Tent will be sited alongside the main area. Chairman thanked all members who attended this event and who gave excellent support over the two days, selling raffle tickets, demonstrating on the lathes and manning the Charity and Sales tables. The Club urgently needs additional tutors for Sundays and Tuesdays. The AWGB will visit the Club for the day and assess members on the tutoring and demonstrator courses. the AWGB will visit Coombe rather than members attending the same courses at other locations throughout the country. Chairman thanked all members who helped with the steam engine competition for Woodworks. This year's subject for the Woodworks' competition is a chess set complete with board. Anyone willing to participate, the Workshop will be available on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday or Friday by arrangement.

**Treasurer's Report**: Treasurer stated his report would be his last as Treasurer. He will remain on the Committee and continue to look after the Diary in the Workshop, the sponsorship for the Newsletter and liaise with contacts for specific events. He referred to his financial report circulated to members in attendance. The expenses had increased due to the increase in room hire charges, lower attendances by members at demonstrations and increased travel costs claimed by demonstrators. More money has been spent on equipment for the Workshop but this has been paid from No.2 account. All raffle tickets were sold out and this financial gain has offset the increased expenditure for Workshop equip-Thanks to Alec Steedman for his success with ticket sales. Treasurer stated that the Incidentals expenses included cost of tea and coffee at the Workshop and Shilton meetings. Increased charges at meetings has helped retain satisfactory balances of the accounts. Treasurer hoped a member would volunteer to take over the position which he has held for fourteen years. Treasurer was applauded for his commitment and long service to the Club.

A question was asked why the Club did not charge a fee for the training at the Workshop. Treasurer stated when the original Agreement was signed between Coombe Abbey Management and the Club, it was stipulated that: no rent would be charged; electricity costs would be met by the Club; woodturning training would be provided by the Club to members of the public free of charge. Treasurer stated the Club is probably the only Club insured to train members of the public in the Workshop. Members of the public are asked to pay a £5 refundable deposit. By providing training in the Workshop it promotes new membership of the Club and donations, via charity boxes, to Air Ambulance. Gerald Griffiths enquired about the cost of the Xmas Party. Treasurer stated the cost was £350, taken from the No.2 account. Treasurer was asked to explain the use of the No.2 account. The No.2 account held monies needed for capital expenditure. All monies collected for the raffle were deposited in

the No.2 account and each year the total collected was split fifty/fifty between the Club's charity i.e. Air Ambulance and Club funds. Treasurer reiterated the offer given by the Chairman re AGWB tutoring and demonstrating courses. AWGB have developed these courses over a number of years, the first tutor training held at Coombe Workshop was attended by Graham Cashmore and Lionel Crabbe. AWGB now provide a DVD for members to work through in their own time. Members can then apply to AWGB for accreditation. AWGB will provide at Coombe Workshop a free one day course for teachers/demonstrators provided five or more members attend. This saves travelling/overnight stay costs if members were to attend the same courses provided by AWGB at venues elsewhere in the country. AWGB loan tools/lathes to new members and offer an annual bursary with attendance at the Seminar held every other year.

Newsletter Editor's Report: Graham's report was read out by the Treasurer. He apologised for his absence due to his wife's ill health. He had produced the 40 page Newsletter monthly throughout 2018 and thanked members for their support by providing photographs, reports, copy and news. He encouraged members to continue to help produce the Newsletter in this way and to contact him with any ideas. There was no change of or charges to sponsors throughout the year. Printing costs remained the same but postage charges increased slightly. Any member receiving a hard copy of the Newsletter who has an email address, please contact Graham to arrange receipt via email (in colour) – this saves postage costs. Graham thanked Eric Taylor for his invaluable help in retaining sponsorship renewals and Andrew Cryer for posting the Newsletter on Club's website each month. Membership figures fell at the beginning of 2018 but this is usually recouped throughout the year. However, this did not happen in 2018 and membership is about a dozen below 150 (peak figure). The reason for this could be lack of teaching provision for potential new Club members on Sundays at the Workshop. Graham wished members a Happy New Year.

All members present were unanimous in wanting the Newsletter to continue. Chairman and Treasurer urged members to support Graham in producing the Newsletter in its 40 page format. Gerald Griffiths proposed a vote of thanks to Graham.

Updates and information about the Festival are published in the Newsletter. Flyers are available for members at the Workshop and for distribution by members to any events, crafters or contacts who might be interested in attending or having a stall. Alec Steedman informed members Alison Elliott, Jill Steedman, Jack Steedman, Janet Blake, Pete Bickley, Martin Hitchiner and himself were on the Committee of the Festival of Crafts

**Programme of Events**: The trifold 2019 programme has not yet been finalised, Graham Ball is awaiting some dates for demonstrations. Colin thanked Bill Nicholson for his work over nine years as Events Secretary. There is one date in September 19 vacant for which Colin hopes a Club member will volunteer so, anyone interested in demonstrating, please contact him. Demonstrators' travel costs are expensive and have to be considered when booking new demonstrators from further afield. Members' low attendance at demonstrations impacts on choice of demonstrators. at a particular meeting. Chairman said the professional demonstrators would not give details of their demonstration in advance. The only turner that did this was the Tiny Turner, Emma Cook. Colin said some demonstrators will give details but others will not. Treasurer said most professional demonstrators keep a diary of what they have demonstrated at particular venues and will try to do something different if booked again at a later date.

Lee Cartwright proposed opening the Workshop on a Thursday for training and charging members who attend, a nominal fee e.g. £2.50 each. Chairman regularly states in the Newsletter if anyone wants training at the Workshop to contact him. He has not received one telephone request. Mick Cryer reports that Andrew Cryer states he does not get any feedback with reference to the website.

Colin Grundy agreed to act as contact for members wanting any training sessions arranged or members willing to demonstrate.

<u>Presentation of Competition Awards</u>: Eric Taylor accepted the Club Member of the Year Award on behalf of Graham Ball. M. Archer won the Warren-Findings Trophy and the Austin Trophy. D. Knight won the Rhodes Trophy and the Jim Elliott Trophy. L. Crabbe won the Roy Nicholls Trophy.

**A.O.B**: <u>Health & Safety/Risk Assessments</u> Tony Carter enquired whether there was a limit on the number of people attending the Workshop at any one time. Treasurer replied there was no specific number stipulated. Member asked if a risk assessment had been carried out. Treasurer confirmed that the last risk assessment was carried out three years ago.

<u>Concessionary Discounts</u> John Greenwood asked if a discount was available at the Café to Club Members. Treasurer confirmed discount was available to members and free parking only when members attend the Workshop. Also discount is available at the Shop, providing member is known as a woodturner from the Workshop.

<u>Coventry City of Culture</u>: Gerald Griffiths enquired whether Club had been issued with a list of events. Chairman replied a list of events had not been received and Club had not been invited to attend events.

<u>Workshop/Lathes</u> Phil Steele said the Workshop does get busy at times, would it be possible to acquire a larger Workshop or look at replacing the lathes. Chairman said it was not possible to acquire a larger Workshop but work is in progress re replacing the lathes. <u>Attendance at Shilton</u> Mick Fitzpatrick asked how well the Thursday evening sessions are attended. Chairman replied the sessions are well attended – more than the Friday evenings sessions were at Bulkington. AGM Agenda & Minutes Stephen Brimacombe suggested distribution of AGM Agenda and Minutes would be cheaper via email or the December Newsletter than printed copies. Treasurer responded that it cost £20 for the print run which is cheaper than using the Newsletter. Not all members have access to email, computers or printers.

Assessment for Teachers Gerald Griffiths asked whether members needed to be assessed prior to teaching juniors. Chairman replied that it is necessary to have a parent, guardian or carer present when teaching under eighteens. Colin Grundy stated, with reference to DBS checks, provided the junior's leader or legal guardian is present, the answer is "No". Treasurer stated he had checked with AWGB who stipulate that anyone under eighteen years old is classed as a minor and, provided you have got it stated in the Workshop "there must be a parent or guardian present at the time of training", the Club is covered. Chairman said from tomorrow (06.01.2019), there will be a book available in the Workshop containing all the Club's policies and procedures relating to health & safety, parental guidance etc. in accordance with the Council and government regulations.

A vote of thanks was proposed for the hard work undertaken during the year by the Committee and Officers.■

# Ron Craythorne

It was with great sadness that I learned from Bob Heathman of the passing of Ron Craythorne on Monday 7th January 2019. As well as a good friend Ron was also a keen wood-turner and club member, always willing to offer his services and exhibit his turnings at our outside events and where possible he was very happy to demonstrate to the public on



his Nova Comet lathe. When his wife Joy was alive Ron opened up his workshop annually to the public assisted by Bob Heathman and John Bradbury charging an entrance fee and selling raffle tickets with the proceeds going to a charity which he and Joy supported.

As Newsletter editor I interviewed Ron for the January 2007 issue when I was running a series of articles entitled "Your Turn to Talk". I have reproduced a little of this interview below which some members who knew him may find interesting.

Ron's funeral will take place at 1.30pm on Friday 8th February at Holy Trinity Church Hinckley followed by a short service at the Heart of England Crematorium Nuneaton.

I am sure everyone in the woodturning club will join with me in offering our sincere condolences to Ron's two daughters at this very sad and difficult time

#### Graham Ball

(Newsletter Editor)

Ron Craythorne was born in Burbage, Leicestershire. He lived in the area known as "Three Pots" for two years before the family moved to a house his father built in Coventry Road Burbage. Ron lived in this house until he was married and then moved to his present house in Wood Street, Hinckley.

Ron attended the Burbage junior school and the Westfield secondary school in Hinckley.

Ron's father Fred Craythorne had his own Carpentry business based in Burbage which Ron joined on leaving school at the age of fifteen. Ron served a five year apprenticeship with his father and attended the Hinckley college where he studied and passed first his City and Guilds intermediate exam and then his City and Guilds finals. The Carpentry business was moved into its present site in Wood Street Hinckley, renting it from the then owner. When the property owner died Fred Craythorne had first option to buy the property which he did, and this was when Ron and his wife Joy moved into the house adjoining the business. Ron's father was still living in Burbage at this time.

Ron was found to be diabetic at the age of fifteen just when he was about to leave school and this condition

prevented him from being called up to serve in the forces.

Fred Craythorne passed away when Ron was aged twenty nine and Ron has run the business ever since.

#### Q When did you take up woodturning

1989. It was when I retired and I was looking for something to do and thought I would have a look at woodturning.

#### Q What make was your first lathe?

I started with a Myford ML8

#### Q What make is your present lathe?

Its a Myford Maestro. This lathe has the variable speed control. I mentioned to John Bradbury that I wanted a better lathe and that I had been happy with my Myford lathe, so he took me over to Nottingham to see the Maestro. Which I bought and returned one Saturday morning with the van to collect the new lathe. I also have the small Nova lathe which I use when travelling to Hands-On meetings and demonstrations. This is a great little lathe and ideal for this purpose. The Coombe Abbey Club have

one and the visiting professionals all seem to get on well with it.

#### Q What aspect of woodturning do you most enjoy?

I enjoy spindle work more than bowl work.

#### Q Where is your preferred venue for selling work?

In actual fact I now sell quite a bit from home as people have got to know me from the open workshop demonstrations. I generally sell quite a bit at Coombe Abbey visitor centre, but I don't care for craft shows as you can spend all day there and not sell enough to make it worthwhile, although the "Burbage Common" craft fair has been very good for me.


