Dear friends,

The Church marks the month of September as the Creation Season during which prayers are said for the works of nature. As Lammas the first festival of harvest occurs just a few weeks beforehand there is an extended focus on the wonders of the world.

Our autumn feasts and festivals celebrating the cyclic bounty, beauty and replenishment are often at odds with events in the daily news. Humanity is undoubtedly damaging the natural world, sometimes irreversibly, through war and greed. This should trouble us all. Political initiatives encouraging nations to address matters as diverse as habitat destruction, persecution, and weaponry, along with the equally important campaigns pleading with individuals and corporate bodies to reduce the demand and use of harmful materials such as carcinogens and single-use plastics are abundant. However few, if any of these worthy initiatives identify the benefits that focusing on our core faith values can bring to the numerous causes.

We are taught to not only love God but to love each other and, indeed all life on earth, as we love ourselves. This simple act, once employed, has the bonus reward of enabling us to discover an inner level of happiness and contentment not before enjoyed. They can also enrich us further through new-found knowledge and understanding if we care to look closer or deeper into them.

If we are willing to look closer or deeper into ourselves and how we can live more actively with our core faith values then we may also find hidden riches within ourselves and others around us that we did not previously know existed.

Along with our planet, we too can be given a new opportunity to flourish.

Diocesan News

Ancient wells, living water

In June we celebrated the 900th anniversary of the original founding of Launde Abbey, now our wonderful retreat and conference centre which we share with the Diocese of Leicester. It was a super weekend of special events involving our own Bishop Donald and Bishops Martyn and Guli from Leicester. The choirs of both cathedrals sang together for the Festival Service. My personal highlight was David Newman's dramatic performance of St Mark's Gospel entirely from memory. We were in awe of his achievement but, more importantly, deeply moved by this simple retelling of the whole gospel story. It was good to hear again the loving tale of Jesus' life and suffering for us, upon which good news Launde Abbey was founded.

Later that same weekend, Gleneagles New Church in Wellingborough hosted a record number of people for the annual Richard Beadon Lecture. The speaker this year was Dave Male, Director of Evangelism and Discipleship for the Church of England and a member of the Archbishop's Council. In one particularly striking part of his talk, he compared our Sunday worship to a coach's half-time team talk in a sports match. "It's absolutely vital," he said. "It can guide, re-focus and inspire the team and can even change the result of the game, but it's not actually the match." To reinforce the point, he quoted the famous saying: "The service begins when the worship ends". Our worship matters deeply, but our daily lives are where we work out our faith in practice.

What linked the two events was a profound appreciation of God's call to practical Christianity. David Newman wrote in his programme notes about St Mark: "My hope and prayer is that you might experience something equally powerful and life-shaping as I did when I first heard the gospel ... and will be inspired to respond afresh to the life-changing commitment of being a disciple of Jesus Christ."

You may wish to use this wonderful prayer which was written for the Launde 900th anniversary, and which I have found really helpful:

Eternal God,

who calls us to draw water from the ancient wells of salvation, and whose Son is the living water from who we can drink and never be thirsty: resource, renew and refresh us, as with gratitude for the past, we step out with confidence into your future; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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Cranford News

St John's Church

It is remiss of us not to have welcomed, through the regular church news spot, in recent times, newcomers to Cranford. We make up for it now — "Welcome"! Even though we may have omitted to say this for some time, you will, of course, have been receiving *Together* every two months as George Potter and his efficient distribution team put one through every letter-box of every house in the village even though the occupants may change.

The benefice continues to maintain the schedule of services even though the interregnum (the period without a Rector) continues. At Cranford we still endeavour to offer a cycle of Communion, Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer services and, occasionally, substituting a simple 'All Age Worship' service for Morning Prayer. Although the age spectrum of the congregation for this latter service tends to be skewed towards the upper end, it has been commented that the simpler approach of these services is as appealing to seniors as we initially thought it would be to juniors!

The report prepared by the church architect in his five-yearly inspection, which we are required by the diocese to have carried out, has now been received. Although it does not reveal any major new problems with the fabric it does list many defects, most of which we were aware, which have now progressed the point where remedial action is recommended in the near future. Some of the necessary work can possibly be carried out by willing and able volunteers but most will need to involve professionals and will be costly.

A recent meeting was held involving representatives from all four parishes in the benefice and from the deanery plus the diocesan Stewardship Officer to assist us to achieve a financial position which will ensure our viability into the future. Although maintenance of the fabric of our churches is, of course, a major element of our overall costs, so also is the annual payment we make to the diocese to go towards their overall costs of employing the 116 full time paid priests currently operating in the Peterborough Diocese.

Action plans to ensure this financial viability going forward are currently being formulated throughout the benefice, more news of Cranford's action plan will follow. *Brian Keech*

Twywell News

On 1st August we celebrate Lammas (from Loaf Mass), the first festival of harvest falling halfway between the summer solstice and the autumn equinox. Lammas also marks the end of the hay-making season. Tenant farmers would have traditionally presented the first harvested crop to their landlord. Lammas being the first festival of the harvest of the season should not be confused with 'the Harvest Festival', which marks the end of the harvest season.

Lammas activities include baking Lammas bread, making corn dollies, besoms (bundles of twigs) along with charms of green Lammas ribbons and sprigs of mint. It is a time of getting together and enjoying large feasts with friends and family. The festival's roots date back to Anglo Saxon times when the festival was referred to as the 'feast of first fruits'. At that time it was customary to bring to church, for the Loaf Mass, a loaf made from the new crop whereafter the loaf, broken into four, was placed at the four corners of a building to protect the contents. Churches now generally might observe Lammas on the first Sunday in August.

'Other news'

The Twywell Festival on Saturday and Sunday 8th and 9th June should have been themed 'Vivaldi' this year as within two days we witnessed the four seasons!

Starting with Saturday's marquee erecting in monsoon conditions a cancellation of the event was seriously considered. However, things improved and the fête afternoon was dry and enjoyable with the musicians and clog dancers providing a perfect backdrop to the stalls, teas, bar and BBQ. The Saturday evening event was a perfect blend of delicious food, wine, music and laughter made magical by the festoons of fairy lights and the flames of the

braziers. The classic car meet and teas on the Sunday was held in bright sunshine and once again attracted a variety of lost marques. As always, the church was open both days and visitors marvelled at the many superb floral displays designed around this year's festival theme 'Land, Sea and Air'.

This was very well received by a large congregation and it is hoped that it can be employed again next year with more volunteers sharing their talents with us. Our very special and beautifully carved choir stalls made a contribution in so far as the congregation recited an abbreviated version of the Benedicite which exhorts the whole of creation to sing praises to God — the basis of the unique African scenes within the carvings.

Twywell Fete, June 2019

What is it about a Fete? It's all about a chosen date. Will it be June? No - that's too soon. But think again, will there be rain? For many years we've had no tears, the day stayed bright, no rain in sight... Until this year!

When we looked out on this June day, one can only stop and say the rain came down in torrents. All credit to the chosen few. Out went the chairs and up went gazebos, everyone drenched and working like heroes to get the job done. Now it is evening, just windless and moon light. chairs re-arranged with braziers bright. Pulled pork and beerhow's that for good cheer? And floating towards us comes music... So ended a day, far, far away from the start with the cold and the wind and the rain. A joyful day at Peterborough Cathedral for the 2019 Ordination services

Sunday 15th July was a very happy day at Peterborough Cathedral as the Ordination of Priests and Deacons services took place. The Cathedral was packed out at both 11am and 4pm to see six curates and eight ordinands make their ordination vows before family, friends and God.

The candidates were presented one-by-one by the Archdeacons of Oakham and Northampton to Bishop Donald (priests) and Bishop John (deacons), before confirmation was made of their calling to serve in their particular ministry.

The Revd Canon Sarah Brown, Canon Missioner of Peterborough Cathedral, gave inspiring sermons in both services, where she talked about "the vulnerability of ordained ministry". At the Ordination of Priests service, she explained that "when priests give a blessing or absolution, it happens – it is easy to underestimate the power we are conferring on these people". She also said that being a priest "is not just about giving communion, it's not enough to maintain the status quo ... pastoral care and Sunday services are not enough. The main priority of the Church is to tell people about Jesus – make sure your activities keep Jesus right at the centre. Your parishes are the world to you – go and make disciples."

At the 4pm Ordination of Deacons service, Sarah said that the ordinands would be "nervous, but absolutely sure of what God is calling them to do". She described the work of a deacon as "a big calling – a wonderful calling – but not without its difficulties. She added that "to be a deacon is to be a servant – it doesn't mean doing everything, but it's doing whatever God calls you to do. Your work will not be cosy – to be a deacon is to be as Christ in the thick of difficulties."

After making vows to confirm their service in the Church, the candidates knelt for the laying on of hands – the priests by eight senior clergy from the Diocese of Peterborough (plus their parish clergy), the deacons by Bishop John. The newly-ordained priests were then presented with Bibles and had their stoles adjusted, while the newly-ordained deacons were given copies of the New Testament and had stoles placed upon them. They were then given prolonged and well-deserved standing ovations as they were officially welcomed into their new roles.
