By this age, we all have different styles of dress for dances and for that matter, everything else in our lives. We are no longer young and impressionable, which is why the current discussion about dressing for square dances is so emotional for

many people. As you know, if you have been reading my articles, at the National Square Dance Convention I attended multiple talks over a few days' time. The talks were primarily aimed at changing our brand identification. The unfortunate reality is if we do not change it effectively, convincingly and quickly, square dancing will soon disappear. We are witnessing more and more consolidation of clubs who can no longer exist on their own, as well as clubs that no longer exist, which is an ominous sign of eventual extinction of all of square dancing. We must change our image if we are going to at least maintain our numbers. If we are successful, we may possibly be able to once again build our membership and not dwindle into oblivion. My son Drew's career and passion is marketing, social media and community building, so "brand development" is a frequent conversation between us. As I was telling him about this article, Drew exclaimed, "Branding is Everything!" There are many aspects to marketing square dancing which were discussed at National. In this article, I am going to limit myself to one of the most controversial, and I believe one of the most crucial.

According to the Callerlab Square Dance Marketing Manual published March 6, 2018 "the only official research on public image of square dancing was conducted by STARworks in 2000." They chose 3 focus groups, 35-55 years of age in 3 areas of the country the South, Middle America and the West Coast (Portland, Oregon). The result of the research was summarized on page 13 as follows:

"Square dancing has an image problem in the general public, particularly among those in the targeted empty nester baby boomer age group. This target population sees square dancing as an out of date, country oriented, for hicks and hillbillies, using old-fashioned music and patronized by senior citizens in fluffy dresses with big hair, big belts and RVs. Most people say they are familiar with square dancing, but their familiarity is with traditional square dancing, not with modern western square dancing. As a result, their image of square dancing is strongly influenced by the traditional square dancing and does not reflect the realities of modern western dance." The research shows clearly that we have a brand issue and that if we want to reverse the decline, we in our club, district, association, state and nation need to re-image ourselves. Suffice it to say, our brand as square dancers is important to all of us even if we don't usually think about it. If the number of dancers dwindles then the number of venues where we can dance decreases, which leads to fewer callers, which in turn leads to fewer dances, which leads to a further decline in membership, etc.

Do you know that it took one of the H&S past members 2 years before I finally relented to going to my first class? The person who kept urging me to try it was someone I respected and liked at the time. I had tried other things that she suggested, however the picture in my head of the dress was so powerful that it prevented me from even going once, for a very long time. Finally, I did agree to go to one class; thinking to myself, if I don't like it and I probably won't, that will be it. Obviously, I stayed. I was beyond the baby boomer age at the time that I was first introduced to square dancing, however the people in the focus groups did reflect my personal feelings. I knew that nothing was going to get me into short skirts, especially with petticoats. However, as I said earlier, we all have our own personal styles of dress and I am sure that some of you would not want under any circumstance to dress as I do. I am only speaking to the effect that the research showed our traditional clothes have on most non-square dancers or, as I like to think of them, potential new square dancers. When I came to my first class, I was amazed that the people that square danced were far from hicks and were thoughtful, fun loving, well educated people who enjoyed many of the things that I did. I was hooked almost immediately by the fun of dancing to the calls and learning new steps. In retrospect, I think now what a shame it would have been had that square dancer not been so persistent. A lesson to us all.

Since our August board meeting, I have been asked repeatedly what it means if we as a club agree to the Associated Square Dancers ("ASqD") portion of the resolution that states that we are discouraging traditional dress. In the August meeting with one exception, everyone was supportive of this change. We will be addressing all the issues in our October board meeting and in our November General meeting. Fredi as Vice President of ASqD will be leading these discussions. My understanding from our board meeting is that traditional square dance clothing will be permitted, however it will be

minutes after the break especially when the dance is poorly attended. The callers do not make enough money to call for the pecuniary compensation. Most of them call for the joy of calling and for the exchange of energy they receive and generate. Let's help them to enjoy calling for R&S by also ending their evening with a full crowd of dancers. To me it is like being at a live theater production. If I leave at the intermission, I am aware that I have figuratively told them they are not worth my time; and if I stay and have enthusiasm until the end, I have rewarded them. That said, thank you to each of you who do

strongly discouraged. In line with this we will not have experienced square dance clothing sales (or giveaways) at our hall. To do so, would be to implicitly say we would like you to wear the traditional outfit and thus to continue the image out in the community. Hopefully, for those of you who do like wearing traditional clothes you will give the image issue special thought. If you are not willing to give up wearing the clothes because it gives you too much pleasure, think about wearing them less often and then only at Plus, not Mainstream, dances. I will confess the latter is my own thinking, and not necessarily anyone else's. At the Mainstream dances we hopefully will have more newcomers dancing, so at least we are promoting the image less. I want to remind people that watching and enjoying performers in costume is very different from wanting to be in that costume yourself, which is what potential students are looking at. I encourage people that feel strongly in either direction to come to the board meeting on Tuesday, October 15th and particularly the General Meeting on November 19th and we will get into a lively discussion. It is important that we all have an opportunity to voice our feelings and thoughts, as well as listening to those of others.

In our last board meeting, we were talking about how important it is that we support the other clubs in our district by going to their dances as much as possible. We had seven squares for our last dance in August with Jon Jones, due to a large turnout of members of other clubs especially the 12 Honeycombers and Boots & Bows. This was in large contrast to our first dance in September with Darren Gallina, also a very good caller, where we had only three squares and two after the break with only three dancers from other clubs. (At most of our dances we go down by one or two squares after the break). I want to encourage dancers, unless for health reasons you can't stay, to please remain for the additional 45 faithfully support our dances and thus our club!

I am so pleased and grateful to announce that Amelia Kacena and Julie DaVanzo have agreed to be our new Dance Refreshment chairs. Please contact them to volunteer for November 23 & December 28th. If you would like to help at the desk, please sign the sheet at the desk.





#### From the North:


**From Sunset Blud:** West of Chautauqua Blud, merge onto the PHC from Malibu, South on the PCH, right on Beach House Way

From Downtown Santa Monica: West at Moomat Ahiko Way, merge onto the PHC, then left at Beach House Way


#### From LA: 10W to PCH then left at Beach House Way





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
