



- Pass mark for GMC: above 7 in all sections with an overall average 7.5
- Expires after 2 years

The basics of IELTs


Main differences include:

- IELTS has 2 variations
- OET has 12
- OET is more specific towards medical professions
- OET is scored by grades and points
- Writing and speaking are profession specific.

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
Useful resources

Basics of Securing a Clinical attachment: Part 1



Entails:

- Online application (rate limiting step)
- Proof of documents Send copies
- Face to face meeting at the GMC offices bring originals
- Your number is granted on the day of the meeting
- Approx 6 weeks to gain registration
- Remember! You can still apply to most trust if your application is pending, you do not need to wait.
- Keep calling




Buy now!





- Ignorance is bliss, you will never get this time back
 - Use it to develop skills for the job as well as skills for yourself.
 - This is easy to forget in the pursuit of a paycheck
- Like a depressing box of pringles, once you 'pop', you cannot stop.

Final few days of freedom



General layout of induction is as follows:

- Not much longer than a week
- · Mix of IT training, seminars and shadowing
- Traditionally not enough for UK and non-UK graduates
- Departmental inductions tend to be more useful (if your department has one)
- Take as much as you can from the previous FY1 doctors
- Practise on IT systems rather than watching tutorials
- This is the time to familiarise yourself with proforma's, guidlines and prescribing
- Many trusts will be happy to provide more time if you're keen

Induction

- The longest night you will ever face
- Remember everyone is in the same boat
- Take advantage of the expectation that you are a new F1
 - Ask ask ask
 - Nurses are your friends
- Not only will it get better, it will also get a little but worse
