The following are copies of decoments deposited. in the chest of All Saints' Church, Hindley. For them we are indebted to Mr. John Leyland, of the Grange, Hindley, who has kindly lent a manuscript book containing many interesting items relating to the township, several of which will be printed in the "Scrap Book," Many of the documents refer to the logal proceedings which ended in or arose out of the consceration of Hindley Chapel The decree of the Duchy Court, the Petition to the Bishop, and the Deed of Consceration are printed in extense in Mr. Leyland's "Memorials of Hindley. The following, and other documents which will be hereafter given, have not been published. -- Editar

DOCUMENT No. 71.

Whereas by Decree of the right Honorable the Chancellor of the Dutchy Court at Westminster It is ordred and adjudged that the minister who shall from tyme to tyme officiate in Hindley Chappell shall be Elected and nominated in such manner as hath been hitherto used & that such minister shall be Duly qualified for the Exercise of the ministers ffunction according to the Laws of this Kingdom and that anch minister soe elected ought to be

ordained lyconsed & qualified according to Law & the Ecclesiastical constitutions of this Kingdom And the sd Decree being Solemnly pronounced in the sd court and since Registered & recorded see that all persons are obliged to take notice thereof at their perill. And whereas their usual way or manner of Election of a minister hath been by the Ffeoffes and inhabitants of the Chappelry of Hindley afored. We therefore the Ffeoffes or Trusteen for the ad Chappel and the Donations thereupto belonging Doe hereby give notice to the rest of the Freoffes and all the Inhabitante that we appoint & desire them to meet together in the sd Channel or Chappelyard upon Thursday the twenty third Day of this Instant June between the hours of nine & twelve of the clock in the aforencen then & there to Elect such Minister see duly qualified or to ad. tourns the Election to some other convenient day as they shall then & there agree upon. And to the end due notice may come to the knowledge of all persons concerned we desire these praents may be fixed on the sd Chappell Door on Sunday next and every day afterwards untill the ad twenty third day of this Instant June And that a messenger be sent to the Ffeoffes and Inhabitants at their usual places of abode to give them personall notice thereof if they can be conveniently mett with.

In Ducat : apud Westm.

John Prescott of Hindley in ye County of Lancaster yeom, aged flourty seaven years or thereaboute one of ye Ffeoffies of ye Chappel of Hindley maketh oath That on ye eighteenth day of this Instant June he this Depondent will sign & subscribe a paper writing reciting Whereas by Decree &c (see Decement No. 71) web ad paper writing was dated & signed by this Deponent we other

Figoffees & several Inhabitants the Eighteenth day of June 1698 & afterwards on ve nineteenth Instant this Deponent fixed ve ad paper writing on ye Chappell door at Hindley, & pursuant thereto he himself did give notice to severall of yo Ficoffee who did sign ye ad notice or paper writing & p'ticularly to Mr. John Green, William Hilton, & several others of ye Inhabitants of Hindley of ye day & place of ye Election aforced who did all appear in vo Chappel yard of Hindley afored at ve time above mentioned for electing of a Minister, but (before ye Election begun) Mr. Green, William Bilton, & about twelve more left ye ad Chappel yard & going from the same towards their severall dwelling houses (as this Deponent believes) ho this Deponent met them, and they being told yo ye Ffeoffes & Inhabitants were going to elect a Minister for Hindley Chappel, Mr. Green answered What have you to do to Elect we do protest against any Election, & we think we have a man in, naming Mr. Thomas Whalley (who has not supplied or preached in ye s4 Chappel for several years as this Deponent very well knows) And this Deponent further saith vt when he wh severall other Ffeoffes & Inhabitants of Hindley came into ye Chappel yard ye so twenty third day of June, they found a paper writing on ve Chappel Door purporting to be a protest against ye Election of any other Minister for ye said Chappel therein pretending to have Elected & chosen Mr Thomas Whalley, but since ve Election some differences have happened concorning ye ad Chappel Minister and Donations weh have been depending in ye Honourable Court of ye Dutchy at Westminster, & also who pretending to be ready to observe yo Decretal order of yo Right Hohorable yo Chancells of yo Dutchy Court aforest but yt they neither saw ve ad Decree, nor was duly served wh any coppy thereof, which so writing or protest was aigued by John Green, William Hilton, Peter Astley, & three more & dated 23rd June 1698 notwithstanding which paper writing Mr John Jackson Clorke, who is a Minister ordained & qualified (as this Deponent verily believes) according to Law & ye Ecclesisatical Constitution of this Kingdom, was duly elected & chosen by

severall Ffeoffes & a great number of Inhabitants of Bindley (& no other person named or voted for) to be Minister of ye ad Chappel, & after ye ad Election, this Deponent wh severall others did signs a Subscription under ye ad protest yt a coppy of ye sd Decree or of ye Ordering part thereof was read in ve presence of ve ad William Hilton, Peter Astley and several other Inhabitants of Hindley at James Smiths in Hindley ve Eighteenth of June Jon. Prescot. instant.

DOCUMENT No 74.

Hindley, 23rd June, 1698.

We the Inhabitants of Hindley, being mett this day together in the Chappell Yard of Hindley according to notice given by severall of the Fisofees and best Inhabitants of Hindley who signified to us by setting up a Publication of the same on the Chappell Doore on Sunday the nineteenth of this Instant June that an Election was this Day to be made of a Minister for ye sd Chappell according to a Late Decree made by the Right Honoble the Chancellt of the Dutchy to that purpose have chosen Jon Jackson Clerke for our Minister and desire the right Reverend father in god Nicholas Lord Bishop of Chester to grant his lycense to the at Mr. Jackson to supply this cure being regularly Elected by us.

DOCUMENT No. 80.

The Case of Hindley Chapell,

The Inhabitants of Hindley in ve Parish of Wigan in ve County of Lone's being many of them more then two miles distant from ye Parish Church Did for their Ordinary Ease of hearing divine Service preaching &c in ye years 1641 Erect a Chappell or place of Oratory in hyndley at ve charg of Severall contributors when ve Act of Uniformity 9th Elizabeth Did Injoyn ye Service of ye Church & Conformity in all Parish Churches Chapells & Ocutoryes which said Chapell was erected by and with the allowance and consent of the then Bish, of the Diocese and the donacous made (wherewith the same is now endowed) Either by Conformable men or in-Conformable funds or both and yt this Chappell according to the intent of its Erection & endowment was supplied by conforming orthodox Divines untill the times of Usurpation when it (as all other Churches and Chappells) was possest of nonconformists and sos continued till the years 1862 at which time the then Minister of the Chappell refuseing to Conforms seconding to the act of 14c Care sedi web Injoyns the service of the Church of England 40 was by the appointmus of the then Bish, of the Diocess turned out and a conformable Divine put in his Room and has see continued ever since through many Successions until July last when their In. cumbent Dved after whose Death a Conformist was Desired to officiate there by most of the Inhabitants but was opposed by Mr. Green and some other Dissenters who prtend that they are Freeffees for the ground on which the Chappell stands and therefore it was in their power to appoint such a Minister as they pleased alledging yt ye last paragraph in the Act for exempting their Masters Prostestants subjects Dissenting from the Chuich of England from the penalties of certaine Lawes printted them to certific this Chappell as a place for the religious worshipp of Dissenters to the Bish. of ye Diocess or to the justices of ye peace att the Quartor sessions which the said Mr. Green very industriously Laboured and at the next Quarter Sessions held at Ormskirke tendered a certificate to

have this Chappell recorded as a place for the worchip of Dissenters but failing there within some few Daies afterwards hos made further application to the Quarter sessions at Manchester to have his said Certificate recorded which was there likewise denyed him But that Mr. Green might receive all possible satisfaction the sessions were adjourned to the Sheriff's table att Lancy where were preent 28 Justices who were all of opinion save one that the Clarke of the place ought not to record Mr. Green's Certificate nor that Hindley Chappell bee by their allowance ever used as a place for the religious worship of Dissenters Dureing the Dependance of his said Certificate att the sessions he also tendered a certificate to ve Bishop and Regr but was there also rejected being a place of publicke worship and soe under ve unrepealed act of 14c Car Sedi web Injoyns the service of the Church in it However a Non Conwas putt in by the Dissenting Meoffors for the Land onely whereon the Chappell was erected age the consent of some other Ffeoffees who still continues in the place and by that moanes the most united Chappelrie in these parts is broken so that sevil p'sons within the said Chappelrie whose ancestors contributed to its erec'on or who have since purchased seats there to hear divine service are deprived of the benefit thereof and the end of the Chappell and Donations by this means perverted.

To prove that George Greene was a Conformable than who gave the Land with about 2° p. ann. whereon the Chappell was Erected the time when and after what mannr it was see and that it was by the Bishops leave and did by his Indenture Dated 17° Carol. primi made between him on the one part and Edward Green and sevil others on the other part recitaing that whereas a Chappell or place of Oratory was intended to be Erected ye foundation thereof being then laid for that purpose did grant and convey to his said Freeffes and their heires for ever ye ground whereon the Chappell was to be built.

This is ye only Guift Mr. Green is Concerned in; [Nors.—A few (unimportant marginal references are not printed.]

The next document printed is exceedingly interesting. It gives the sworn evidence of John Prescott, one of the subscribers to the notice summoning the feoffes and inhabitants to elect a minister (See Doc. No. 71), and one of the leading supporters of the Rev. John Jackson, the then elected conforming minister of Hindley Chapel. In the absence of a list of the interrogatories the purport of them can be gathered from the attested evidence. The document is lengthy.

DOCUMENT No. 82,

John Prescott of Hindley in the County of Lancer, gent aged 46 years or thereabouts sworne and examined.

 To the first Interr: he saith that he knows all the parties Exeptants and respondents in this cause.

8. To the eighth interr : hee saith that he heard James Snape late of Bindley deed give his evidence or Testimony before the Cours for Charitable uses. that Chisenball Brettergh deed in his life time was a contributor & also an undertaker touching the erections of hindley Chappel and the seats or power therein made and saith that the said Chisenhall Brettergh as he beleeves had a seat or pew in the said Chappel and died possessed thereof after whose decease Alice Brettergh (Widdow and relict of the said Chisenhall) sould and conveyed the said seat or new unto Ralph Prescott deceased (This deponts late (ather) who by virtue thereof held and enjoyed the same during his life and this deponent (since his death) held and enjoyed the same and hath now the right and interest thereof and further saith yt the several persons hereafter named have seats or pews within the said Chappel either by descent from their Ancestors who paid for the building thereof or by title & derivatives under such persons as purchased the same. That is to say Gilbte Pennington, Robt. Adams, Jonathan Thomason, Peter Worthington, John Ranicars, Thomas Lithgow,

John Asshurst, John Morres, Wilh: Aspull, Benjamin Smethurst, Wilh: Needham, John Maren, Thurston Snape, Ralph Green, Wilh: Pemberton, Thomas Hey, & him this deponent all and every which said persons besides this deponent are in this deponents estimation and as they have very lately declared themselves conformable to the Church of England and the Liturgy thereof and new do and since the Exept Thomas Whalley got into the possession of the said Chappell have gone from theirs own Chappell to hear divine service at the Parish Church of Wiggan, & also at Leigh, Weethoughton, and other Churches or Chappells because they cannot have the book of common prayer read at their own Chappell within Hindley afores.

- 9. To the ninth interogatory he saith that there was a Chancell builded at the east end of the sd Chappell of Hindley wich is narrower in proportion than the sd Chappell itselfe and that there was likewise a Bell hung up in the said Chappell wherewith to summon and call the inhabitants to divine service and sermon therest and also a communion table placed therein and hath heard and believes the said Chappell and seats and also the said Bell and communion Table were erected and provided at the general charge of the sd Inhabitants.
- 15. To the 15th interogatory he saith he did well know James Space decd in the interogatory named. and was by and present when the said James Snape about five years agone appeared before the comra for charitable uses in the town Hall of Wigan and being sworns to give his testimony touching the matters in Question did give in evidence that Mrs. Frances Duckenfield, Adam Aspall, Thomas Chetham. Roper Culcheth, John Guest, John Aspull. John Marsh, Adam Robertson, Thomas Robertson, Robert Greenhalgh, William Sale, Thomas Morres, John Seddon, Chisenall Brettergh, Humphrey Platt, Thomas Lithgoe, John Marsh, & Thurston Suspe (late father of him the said James Snape) had been characterized for a Puritan yet that he was really otherwise and that he used the prayers of the Church constantly in his own family all which this depont better remembers & is satis-

fied therein for that the said James Snape bad (before his giving of the said evidence) desired this depon to write down the names of the affored persons in order to the aupplying and refreshing of his memory upon his giving of the said evidence which this deponent did accordingly and hath the same notes now in his custody which enable him to give the account above mentioned,

17. To the 17th interogatory he saith he did well know Edward Green (son of George Green) in the interogatory named who was one of the foofees or Trustees named in his father's conveyance wherehy that spot of ground whereon the said chappell was erected was granted away and also the Chappell vard thereunto belonging which said Edward Green came very frequently to the prayers of the Church in the said Chappell and at the time of his death left £20 towards the maintainance of a minister of the said Chappell and saith that when he so left the said money one Mr. Robt. Bradshaw was then minister of the said chappell and that he the said Mr. Bradshaw was a person conformable to the church of England and the liturgy thereof & preached the funerall sermon of him the st Edward Green after his decease.

27. To the 27th interogatory he saith that he very well remembers Mr. Dennis in the interr. Was minister of Hindley Chappell that as he remembers and believes he and was succeeded by one Mr. Atherton, and that Mr. Atherton was succeeded by Mr. John Wood. who was succeeded by Mr. Richard Croston, who was succeeded by the afore-named Mr. Robert Bradshaw, who was succeeded by Mr. Samuel Shaw, who was succeeded by Mr. James Shaw, in the interrog severally named all which said persons were conformable to the Church of England and the liturgy thereof and saith that the said Mr. Bradahaw had a license from the Bishopp of this Dioceas to officiate in the said chappell and that he this deponent hath seen the same and believes some others of the said ministers had likewise licenses to preach and officiate in the said chappell but which of them in particular had such licenses he knows not.

28. To the 28th interogatory be saith that he never knew vt the feefees or Trustees of the said George Green ever pretended to choose a minister to officiate at the said chapell until the last election that the exceptant John Green made such a pitches but that during all the time of this Deponents Remembrance the said minister was chosen by the inhabitants of the chappell or the greater part of them and that when they met together upon yt occasion they always proposed and discoursed of choosing a conformable Minister or else (as some of them usually expressed) the chappell doors would have been locked up, and further saith that when the aforenamed Mr. James Shaw was elected minister of the said chappell he this deponent with several others of the said inhabitants recatired to Mr. Wros now Doctor of Divinity and Warden of Manchester but then curate of the said parish church of Wican in order to have the said Mr. Shaw licensed to the said chappelry which said Doctor (after he had discoursed the said Mr. Shaw) promised to recomend him to the Bishopp for the purpose aforest which said Bishop was also Rector of the said parish church of Wigan.

29. To the 29th interogatory he saith that he very well remembers yt Mr. John Wood, Mr. Robert Bradshaw, and Mr. James Shaw, during the respective times of their officiating at the said chappell did frequently god to the Parish Church of Wigan at Xmas Easter and Whitsunday to Assist the curate there in reading prayers presching and administraing of the Sacrament and yt they equally gave notice thereof in the said invited their Auditors to goe with them or come to the Sacrament and that he this deponent & many of the heads of the said inhabiting familyes did frequently go to the said larish Church and receive the said Sacrament accordingly.

30. To the 30th interogatory he saith that the aforenamed Mr. Wood Mr. Robt. Bradshaw and Mr. James Shaw did very frequently Christen children in the said Chappell and bury the dead in the said chappell yard in such sort sad manner as in and by the Rubrick of the book of Common

Prayer is in that behalfe prescribed and directed and saith that one Mr. Williamson formerly minister of the all chappell and also the said Mr. James Shaw dyed whilst they were Ministers of the said Chappell and are severally buryed in the chappell yard there.

32 and 36. To the 32nd and 56th interogatory he saith that there several gifts and donations given and bestowed by divers and sundry persons for and towards the maintenance of a minister at Hindley Chappell as particularly the sum of six pounds per annun given by John Rainacars and secured by a reut charge upon some lands in Himiley and Pennington The sam of 52 per annugiven by Mrs. Frances Dakinfield and secured by a rent charge forth of certain Lands in the County of Chester, a parcel of Lands in possion worth four pounds tenn Shillings per annm. or thereabouts given by Randle Collier and another parcell of Lands in reversion ofter one life given by the said Randle Collier worth 66 per annu. A parcell of Land worth 15s per annua Given by Humphrey Plat, the sam of tenn pounds in moneys given by Oliver Stepfor h, the like sum of tenn pounds in moneys given by The. Aspull the sum of three pounds in moneys given by William Sale the Elder the like sum of three pounds in moneys given by Will. Sale the younger the sum of fifty pounds in moneys given by Mary Collier (widdow and reliet of the said Raudle Collier) the sum of twenty pounds in moneys given by the aforenamed Edward Green and 15s per annu. or thereabouts given by Mr. The Cook the product of which ad moneys the said deponent hath seen diverse times paid to severall of the said curates and saith he doth not remember the said John Rainscars but as to all the rest of the said persons (Except Mrs. Dukenfield and Humphrey Plat) this deponent had seen them frequently come to divine service sermon in the said Chappell. and as for the said Humphrey Platt he this deponent very well remembers that the said James Snape did give in evidence before the said Comra of Charytable uses that at the sel Erecting of the said Chappell he was a person conformable to the Church of England and the liturgy thereof.

93. To the 33rd interogatory he saith that some short time before the decease of the said Mr. James Shaw the Exeptant Mr. Thomas Whalley got into possession of the sd Chappell but how or in what manner he got into the same knows not but saith that he remembers it was upon a Lords Day and in the afternoon of the same day this Dept observed that the lock of the said Chappell door had been broken open but by whom he doth not know.

34. To the 34th Interogatory he saith that he doth not know of what perswasion in religion this Except Thomas Whalley is but believes that he is either a Fresbyterian or Independent and saith that not long after the said Mr. Whalley was got into possession of the said Chappell to wit upon Sunday the fifth of November 1691 he this Deponent (being then one of the Churchwardens of Wigan) brought a book of common prayer to the said Mr. Whalley and delivered the same in the Chappell ante him to be by him read in the said Chappell but he the said Mr. Whalley refused to read the same nor never since read the s4 book of common prayers in the said Chappell as this Deponent ever heard of.

35. To the 35th interogatory he saith that after the death of the ed Mr. James Shaw he this Deponent with severall others of the inhabitants of Hindley went to Wigan to wait upon Doctor Stratford then and now Lord Bishop of Chester to request his Lordship to license Mr. Bristowe in the Interogatory named to succeed the said Mr. Shaw in the Chappellry of Hindley and the said Bishop then promised a license accordingly if the taid Mr. Bristowe would accept thereof and the said Mr. Bristowe had a license to the said place as he afterwards told this Deponent and this Deponent went with the s4 Mr. Bristowe upon a Sunday when be first went to preach at the Chappell and when he came to the Chappell Door finding the same locked hee this Deponent heaved up the latch of the said Door & asking who was within the Chappell was answered by the Exceptant Wilh: Hilton yt he was within the same, where upon the said Mr. Bristowe acquainted him the said Bilton that he had the the Bishops' license to officiate in the said Chappell and offering to produce and show him the same

Demanded by virtue thereof the possession of the said Chappell where the said Hilton answered that he would deliver no possion & that the said Bishop had nothing to doe there and being further asked whether he would resist the said Bishop in authority answered that he would and there upon the said Mr. Bristowe returned back without getting possion of the said Chappell or any other answer relating thereunto than as aforesd.

38. To the 38th interogatory he saith that the Exceptants and Trustees John Green, Thom Rycroft, Richard Tonge, James Chetham, Peter Astley, Willm. Hilton, Henry Hart, and James Naylor, have designed and endeavoured to convert the sa Chappell into a meeting place for Dissenters from the Church of England and in order thereto did keep and continue the said Tho Whalley therein for two years or thereabouts but whether they or any of ym, have converted the profits & pducts, of the said donations for the use of the said Tho Whalley or no this Deponent knowsth not.

40. To the 40th interogatory he saith that the Exept John Green doth not live in Hindley nor never had any estate there or sext or Pew in the said Chappell yt this Deponent knows or ever heard of but that he lives in Wigan which is above two miles distant from the same and this Deponent never observed the said John Green come frequently to hear divine service in the same Chappell.

49. To the 49th Interogatory he saith that he knows the severall Trustees named in the Deeds of Lease and release made by Willim Crook in the interr named and saith that all the said Trustees or feefees named in the said deeds and who at the time of the making thereof lived within the said Chappelry most usually came to divine service and sermon in the said Chappell and very seldom or never absented themselves from prayers of the said Church when the came to the said Chappell.

51. To the filst interogatory he saith that he was present when Thomas Rigby in the interr named appeared before the comms, for charitable uses in the town hall of Wigan to give his evidence in the Exept's behalf touching the matters in variance and the said Thomas Rigby being sworne did

then and there give in evidence amongst other things that Mr. Tonge in the interr, named who was reported to be the 1st setled ministerat Bindley Chappell did read the Book of common prayer or used the prayers of the Church of England in the said church and this Deponent saith that he better remembers the same for that some short time after this Deponent meeting with the Exentant John Green at the house of Robte, ffinch of Wivan In-Kacper since deceased and having some discourse with him touching the said evidence given by the ad The Righy Repocially as it related to the ad Mr. Tonger reading of prayers in the said Chappell he the said John Green offered to water 100% with this Dependent that the said Thomas Righy would not swear the same and this Deponent offering to take his wager yt of Rigbie had given in his Evidence as aforesaid and the said John Green refusing that affer he this Deponent there upon said unto him you have perhaps instructed him better or to that affect.

63. To the 53rd Interspetery he saith that during the time the said Mr. James Shaw was Curate and officiated at Hindley all and every the inhabiting Protestacis within the Chappelry Except James Maylor the Edder generally came to prayers divine service and sermen within the of Chappell and none of them ever declined the same, refused the same (Except as aforesaid) during the time of Mr. Shaw's ministry.

54. To the 54th Interestory he saith that he this Deponent and some of the said Trustees and many of the inhabitants within the said Chappelry of Hindley (who have Seats and Pews in the said Chappell) have been necessitated since the said Mr. Whalley get possion of the said Chappell to go as far as Wigan, Leigh, Westhoughton, and severall other deurches or obspells there abouts to hear and joyne in the prayers and service of Church of England because the said Except did not read the same within the said Chappell of Hindley.

The following inemorandum is written at the beginning of a book which is deposited in the chest in the vestery of All Scints' Church, Hindley.

The under-written Memorandum relating to the Chapel of Hindley is thought worthy of preservation. It is copied from an old paper now in the possession of William Chistall, Chattal Clark, and seems to have been part of the Instructions to the Solicitor of the Court of Chancery for the Duch+ of Landaster, pending the suit between the Conformists and Nonconformists, inhabitsuts of Hindley. On the back of the paper is written-John Bridgeman, S.T.P., Rector of Wigan and Bargor, Prebendary of Litchfield and Peterborough, was elected Bishop of Chester March 15, 1613. Died 1657 or 68.

Memorandum.—To prove the Distance the Inhabitants of Hindley are from their Parish Church and their going to Chester to obtain leave

from the Eishop (who was also Par-) son of Wigan) to build a Chapel I for the case of the Inhabitants, James Snape which the Bishop gave his consent to, and immediately afterwards they set about the work. The >Thos. Hay Chapel was finished in 1641 by several Persons in that Town who were called undertakers, and Lobt, Green others that contributed to have

seats in the Chapel.

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NOTES RESPECTING HINDLEY.

Richard Mather was born in Crow-lane, Newton, in 1777, and removed to Hindley with his father when he was nine years old. Here he continued to live until his death, which occurred on the 7th of Angust, 1859. He kept a book he called a diary, but which was not a diary, but a book of memoranda relating to Hindley.

A copy of the entire book has been kindly lent by Mr. John Leyland, the Grange, Hindley, and the following are extracts of interest.

OLD INHABITANTS OF HINDLEY, -Remarks upon the old established homsbolders and chief inhabitants of Hindley, begining with the Clarks of the Chapel of Hindley, Protestant, &c .- James Chignall Clark in 1760, his son William, 1788, both together was in office better than 68 years. The different names under mentioned consisted principally the choir :-Old Robert Grime and his wife Catherin; Old Richd. Chianal, dog Pool; Old Alexy. Winward, Gennel; Old Thomas Oakes. Women : - Betty Grime, Molly Eatock, Ann Grime, 1813. - Joseph Oakes entered upon the office sexton, died September 9th, 1856. Singers :- Ann Grime, died Angt 28, 1811. Wm. her husband in Febs. 8, 1825, ages 66, was a singer and instrument player 53 yeard and leader of the choir 40 years another choir their of springs nearly continued untill about the year 1839 and there seats taken from them & the brace plates pul'd of seats by Mr. Walker. SUNDAY SCHOOLS.—Begun in 1785 Founded and Established by Ralph Peters Plat Bridge First School in Vipers Alley Mr. Eccles schoolmaster. The other on Hindley Common Teacher Adam Rigby continued 3 years until Mr. Peters erected 2 schools one on Chapel Geeen the other in Mill Lane. The first charrity sermon was preached 1786 Oct 15th by Mr. Bennet Minister at St. Mary's Manchester. Mr. Peters fetch the children from Manchester in a coach, the collection was £22 7s. 6 pence.

NEXT THE IMPROVEMENT OF THE ROADS.—In 1786 the roads to Wigan and Ashton was through the Brooks to Wigan a stone platt laid for foot Peopli and to Ashton from Bird likewise to the old houses next upon the left where Old Edward Smith cobler lived it was releived a little and came out a little higher the roads from Bird eth hand upon each roads was much raised-by Benj Eckeraley &c., Surveyors and paved about 1798 or 1799 by the Town. The road up Mill Lane was once in 1787 a Gravel road maintaind by the Township of Rindley the foot road going down the lane was upon John Aspinal side 3 feet higher than the cart road with large cops and stubs to keep teams of. In 1789 Stoney lean was raised by John Marteew oversour and paved by Steven Brooks in or about 1796 or Cart road was paved 1801 to Mr. Pennington Gate and in 1803 further on by Thes. Estock. Not an house upon the right side going from the Presbytain Houses to the Old Houses faceing John Lows weelwright abop on the other side at 1787. Not one from Mill twining to John Low shop exceping John Burchal Carding Place. Year after Mr. Peter Marsh built those other Step Honses. next building was Dawber row now Henry Lows and the Catholic Chapel 1792 or 1793 the 3 following cottages John Swift built now Pawdens-but the Sunday School before the above Pawdens built, 1789 then the Barracks built by Mr. Landel a prentice of Mr. Nichs Marsh to the Manufactor Builenels for a warehouse. About 1793 or 1794 upon the other side of the lane Mr. Pennington built an house &c. 1791. Landale and Phillips Dichfield prentice Tennant on the left John Aspinal about 1808. In 1790 under old Lydia Woods hedge and trees faceing Bird hand was an old house which Mr. Sumner father bought was puld down and the ancient Penneleis Bench demolished from under çop.

1781. Old Club begun, Timothy Estock Clark

Jucreach the waste land in the Plat lean near a Quarter Acre was taken in by Mr. Keansley and Edmon Mandley in or about 1798. About 4 years after Roger Eckersley took the waste land in at Chapel Green nearly halfacre.

Lowe Soucol.—There is in the Township of Hindley a school with the following inscriptions thereon :- "This School was built by the Gift of Mrs. Mary Abram, Widow, whole soul I trust triumpheth now amongst the Just. Anno Domini 1622." A dwelling house for the Master sjoining the School and there the small closes, containing about one acre & a quarter of land at eight yards to the perch all of which premises are occupied by the Master rent free. There is also the sum of £150 pounds secured by bond given by the Corporation of Liverpool bearing date 12 May 1787 with interest at 44 p cent. given to Raiph Peters, Robert Holt Leigh, and four others, as Trustees of and for Lowe School in Hindley. This School is further endowed. with the yearly sum of £1 charged by Frances Duckinfield on Land at Mobberly as more particularly mentioned hereafter under a Strict head. In addition to the advantage the Master derives from the occupation of the house and land above men. tioned he receives from the Corporation of Liverpool which is £1. 0. 0: Mr. Clough in respect of Crook Charity 21. 0. 0; the Agent of Wilkbraham Ruerton Esqr. in respect Ducy Clay 21, 0, 0. In 1834 Mr. Mathews Low school master taught in the old School Chapel Green for about two years was clerk for Township left 1834. Mr. Mathews left about 1884 stopt 8 years. John Pollard entered 1842 (absent 8 years) left in 1846 was absent again up to Nov. 1840, 4 years.

The following is extracted from the book deposited in a chest in the vestry of All Saints' Church, Hindley, referred to in Scrap Note, No. 20. The documents printed below occupy page 1 to 6 inclusive. The succeeding pages—7 to 13—

The next document relates to the rent charge of £6 per annum devised by John Ranicars to the Minister of Hindley Chapel. It is headed as follows:—Friday, 18th June, 1869, in the Duchy Court of Lancaster Trinity term in the Blet year of the Reign of King Charles the Second between Edward Green Peter Harrison William Crook-William Dennys John Green Nathaniel Molyneux Jeremiah Harrison William Chetam and Ralph Prescot. Plaintiffs Ellen Ranicare Pearse Raincare John Thomason and Richard Hilton Defendants.

The will of William Sale of Hindley Shoemaker dated January 4th 1678. The following extracts relate to the township of Hindley:—And the sum of three pounds residue thereof to and for the Use of Hindley Chapel. Item I give to the poor people of Hindley aforesaid the sum of forty shillings.

The will of Thomas Aspal of Hindley Yeoman dated August 29th 1678. The following extract relates to the chapel of Hindley:—Item I give the sum of ten pounds to Hindley Chapel for the augmenting of the Stock towards the better maintenance of a preaching minister.

The will of Edward Green of Hindley gentleman dated February 17th 1680. The following extract relates to the Chapel of Hindley:—And the sum of twenty Pounds to be as an augmentation to the Chapel Stock of Hindley to the Intent that the yearly Benefit and Interest thereof may be converted and imployed to and for the use of a preach, ing minister at Hindley Chapel and not elsewhere and the sum of ten pounds to be put forth and disposed to and for the poor within Hindley aforesaid by the Minister for the Timebeing and my said Enors hereafter named and their Heirs for ever.

The following is an account extracted from the book referred to in Notes 20. 23, and 35. The number process pages 54 to 50. It gives a commoted account of the ending of the dispute between the Non-conformist and Conformist inhabitants of Hindley. A Table of Benefactions suspended inside the Church and printed in Mr. Leyland's Newcoints of Hindley, will be interesting to compare with the statement of accounts written in the book preserved in the Church Chest. On this Table we read ;—

"This Chapel and an house for the curate was built about the year 1541 by the inhabitants of Hindley, the ground being given by George and Edward Green."

The chapel of Hindley being violently and by force taken out of the hands of the Right Reverend. Father in God, Doctor Nicholas Stratford, Lord Bishop of Chester, and of some of the Fooffees inhabitants of the said town, honest men and stout opposers of schism and division, in the year of our Lord, 1890, by John Green, of Wigan, and other Feoffees and inhabitants of the said town. Dissenthre from the Church of Eugland, they the said John Green and his adherents did at that instant erroneously elect a Nonconforming Minister at the said chapel contrary to the pious and well-meaning intentions of the founders and benefactors to the said chapel. But the Rector unwilling to lose a chape! within his own parish, at his own proper charge issued out a commission of pious uses, and obtained a Decree against them which Decree (they the said John Green and others making many exceptions against) came to be argued in the Honble Duchy Court at Westminster before divers Chancellors successively presiding in the said court, where at last the said Rector, after a tedious and expensive suit, obtained a further Decree against the said John Green and others, the ordering part whereof is as followeth :---

Monday. 7th March, 1697.

In the Chancery of the Duchy of Lancaster, after Hilary Term, in the tenth year of the reign of King William the Third.

Between John Green, geatleman; Thomas Rycroft, Richard Tong, William Hulton, Peter Astley, James Naylor, Thomas Whalley, and other exceptants to the Decree of the Commissioners for pious uses of a certain place called Hindley Chapel, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, against William

Ford and others, respondents: Whereas a Degree was made by the Commissioners for charitable uses the same being as followeth, to wit, at Wigan, &c . to which refer; after which followeth the ordering part thus :- Now, this day, the cause having been set down in the Paper of Causes for the court's judgment, the Right Henographe the Chancellor of this Court being again assisted with Sir Edward Ward, Knight, Lord Chief Baron of his Majesty's Court of Exchequer; Sir Edward Nevil, Knight, one of the Justices of his Majesty's Court of Common Pleas; and Sir John Turton, Knight, one of the Justices of his Majesty's Court of King's Bench, the Judges' sesistante of this court, the said Right Honourable the Chancellor of this Court was pleased to declare, etc. declaring in what particulars the Degree is to be amended, it concludes :- And it is further ordered, adjudged, and decreed by the said Right Henourable the Chancellor and Council of this Court by like advice, that it be and hereby is referred to the Clerk of this Court, or his deputy, to examine what arrease of money given for the use of a preaching miniater at the said chapel have accrued. since the 17th day of March, 1661. The trustees are to be accountable for the same. And it is lastly ordered, adjudged, and decreed by the said Right Honourable the Chancellor and Conneil of this Court by and with the advice of the said Judges' assistants that as to such part or part of the said Decree as are not altered and amended as aforesaid, the same do hereby stand ratified and confirmed. It is dated \$5 Jame. 1695) Accordingly the mid minister obtained a license for the said shapel, the 25th day of the said mouth of June. Likewise the said Chapel of Kindley was conscerated by the said Right Reverend Father in God, Nicholas, Lord Bishep of Chester, upon the Peasts of All Souls, below the first day of Nevenber, in the year of our Land God, 1496. Not long after, in order to complete what was leaking on the respondents' part towards their fulfilling the said docree an account or obergy of nature believeding to the said chapel, which had secreed during the eight years' vacancy was sent to the said Duchy Court by the other Feoffees, and a discount or discharge as far as could be proved of the same by John Green and others, upon arguing whereof an order was obtained in the said court for the payment of the said arrears, deducting the said discharge to William Ford and others, respondents in the said decree, who by an instrument under their hands authorised and deputed Mr. John Prescott to receive the same, which said order and histograms to are as follows:--

Which £56 is let out to Mr. Ralph Peters, of Liverpool, the 4th day of June, 1701, and secured by the said Ralph Peters and Richard Lucker, of Inco.

In the year of our Lord 1639, utenalls for the sacrament were bought at the sole charge of the orthodox and Church party, inhabitants within the Chapelry of Hindley, and Mr. Satauel Hilton, of Aspull, and bestowed on the said chapel, viz. :-One table clouth and napkin, two powter flaggens and a powter plate, one cilver chalics and cover (weighing Son & 13t. 6dwt., touched or marked with the letters T. P.), and an earthon bottle coutaining three quarts to fetch wine from Wigan. And in the same year Mr. Worthington, of Hindley aforemid, did bestew on the said chancl. at his bwn proper charge mether uilvet chalice proportionable to the former, having his cut upon the cover, and the body thereof, which is a gost stepping on a thorn, and on the other side of the chalice the following epigram, wrote in Letin, thus in English :- "Peter Worthington, of Hindley, Esq., a captuin of the militim of this county, and the first who after the consecration of this Chapel voluntarily undertook the effice of the chanci warden, did with this silver chalice given to Ged. not us, munificiently embellished the table of the Lord."

RANDLE COLLIER, OF HINDLEY.

Two centuries age one Randle Callier, a pursue evidently of substantial means, resided in Hindley. Nothing is known of him beyond the records preserved of his bounties. Unquestionably, he was a henevolent man. All Saints' Church or Chapel was built in 1641, and like most other new churches both then and since, was at first immiliating minister. In the Table of Benefactors hung inside the walls of the church, it is recorded that Randle Collier gave houses and land in Hindley to the yearly value of £10 7s., for the support of the minister. References to his Will,—which appears to have been dated Sept. Stb, 1682,—are met with

in the papers deposited in the Church Chest, but a copy of the Will itself has not been found, although search has been made for it both there and at the Diocesan Registry at Chester. The Linea Cloth Charity distributed every New Year's Day, at the Sunday School, to the aged and necessitous, owes its origin to him. 250 was given by his Will for the support of this Charity, which sum was augmented by subsequent benefactors until it reached \$151 6s , the amount new vested for its apport in consols. Every year the hearts of more than 20 aged people are gladdened and their comforts increased by the gift of linen cloth through his sotive benevolence. His wife followed in his footsteps, and devised in her will #20 for the augmentation of the some Charity. The Probate of her Will has been kept among the papers of my family, and an abstract may be interesting. If any of your readers can throw any light upon the history of the Cofficer is would prove of local, if not of wider, interest. A tradition exists in the Seddon family that the Colliers and the Seddons were connected by relationship. ...J. La Hindley.

The probate of the Will is dated 39 Oct., 1684, the Will being dated 12 September, in the same year. The executors to the Will were Ralph Green and Mathew Astley, of Hindley. The teatator leaves the following public bequests:-"Item, my will and mind is and I do bequeath to Mr. Peter Worthington, Mathew Astley, John Prescott, James Marsh, William Peters, Robert Thomason, Mathew Seddon, and William Cheetham, of Hindley aforesaid, my trusty friends, the sum of Fifty Pounds to bee paid or well secured to them by Richard Tonnge, of Hindley, his beire or assignes, in full satisfaction of a debt of One Hundred Pounds which hee lately ought to the said Randle Collier, my late husband, nevertheless in trust to bee by them the sd Mr. Peter Worthington, etc., and the survivour and survivours of them his or their heires and successors from tyme to tyme for to be sett forth and improved to the best advantage, viz. : by purchasing of lands, rents, or loans on interest or otherwise, and that all the ad

yearly benefitt, interest, profit, and advantage of the same shall bee yearlye disposed of, imployed onto, or for the only use and behoofe of such orthodox preacher or minister of God's Word and sacraments as for ye tyme beeing is and see from tyme to tyme for ever hereafter shall be lawfully authorized to officiate or presch at or in the Chappell or place commonly called Hindley Chapel. within Hindley aforesaid, for and towards the better maintenence of such minister and ministers. for ever. Item, my will and mind is and I doe hereby give and bequeath the sum of fforty pounds which is due to mee by bond from Ralph Sale and William Ranicar unto Mr. Peter Worthington, etc. Fsame conditions as in former bequest], and that all the yearly benefit, etc., bee disposed of in manner and forme following, viz. : that the benefit and advantage of the one twenty pounds be honestly and justly bestowed on linen cloath to be equally and impartially divided at Hindley Chappell upon every first day of January yearlye amongst and anto the poore inhabitants of Hindley at the discreson of the aforesaid Mr. Peter Worthington. etc. Item, it is my will, etc., that the yearlye profitte of the other twenty pounds be equally and impartially given unto and divided amongst the poore inhabitants of the township of Ince in Makerfield, at the discretion of the aforesaid Mr. Peter Worthington, etc., yearlye and every years for ever." The testator directs that she shall be buried beside her husband in the Parish Church of Wigan, -Editor.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, HINDLEY.

Below is given the remainder of the contents of the book preserved in the Church Chest of All Saints', Hindley, from which extracts have been previously given (see Nos. 20, 33, 35, and 50), and for which we are indebted to Mr. John Leyland.

WILL OF JOHN PRESCOTT.

Will of John Prescott, of Hindley, Yeoman, dated October 13th, 1712. The following extract relates to the Chapel of Hindley;—Item

from and after the raising and paying of the said legacies as aforesaid I give, grant, devise, and bequeath all my said messuages, lands, and premises with all and every the appurtenances and the reversion and reversions remainder and remainders thereof and of every part thereof unto my nephew, Ralph Prescott, of Liverpool, linen draper, his heirs and assigns, for ever the remainder of the said term of fourteen years then to come and unexpired being then to cease and determine nevertheless charged and chargeable with the payment of ten shillings a year to the Protestant preaching minister at Hindley Chapel to be paid on every first day of January next after my decease for ever.

MEMORANDA.

Memorandum,—That in the year 1717 and 1818 there was laid out of the Chapel Stock £46 upon the new building at the curates' houses, besides £20 5s. 9d which was gathered from contributors.

Samuel Lever, Curate.

Margaret Hart, of Hindley, spinster by her last will and testament, bearing date August the 27th, 1727, gave five pounds to the Chapel of Hindley. 23 of which was afterwards laid out in the purchase of a small parcel of land at the back of the curates' bouses from John Green, and the other two pounds were added to the Chapel stock of money.

Samuel Lever, Curate.

January 10, 1736. - In the year 1710 ten pounds of the Chapel's money was lost by the failure of Mr. Holms, of Holland, which money was not out to him at interest by Captain Worthington in his own name (as Mr. John Prescott has often complained to me the said Captain being no feoffee for the Chapel), but how the Captain got it into his hands I know not. Mr. John Prescott paid me from Mr. Holme 12s, for interest July the 30th. 1709, due some time in the month of April in the same year, which was the last and first money that I ever received upon this account. I have made what inquiry I could after the bond but could never recover it. The less of this \$10 (I believe) is the reason why Mr. Ranicars, who, I suppose, wrote the account on the page foregoing, sets down Edward Green's gift as ten pounds only, whereas it really was twenty pounds (as appears on page 42 of the old book). Possibly the money lost might be part of this legacy or gift,

Samuel Lever, Curate.

Memorandum: 30th May, 1777.—Holt Leigh, Eaq., paid in to the feeffees of Hindley Chapel the £100 (a legacy from Mr. Wells to the said Chapel) and likewise £21 10s. 74d., money which belonged to the Chapel recovered of Waterworth Bond, both which sums were in the hands of Mr. Alexander Leigh, his late father. And June 13th next following Mr. Thomas Guest, of Lowton, paid in £80, money in his hands belonging to the said Chapel, and these three sums were applied by the feoffees to procure the bounty of Queen Anne to the Chapel.

20th October, 1779.—The deeds relating to the estate in Hindley (called Rosbottoms) which was purchased by the bounty as above were executed this day. The purchase money amounted to £430, of which £200 only were paid out of the bounty, so that £45 which were in the hands of Mr. James Green, of Lowton (belonging to the Chapel), were

obliged to be called in. He naid in the last sum November 10th, 1780, to James Eckersley and Robert Ashton, two of the feoffees of the Chapel, to make up the deficiency of the £30 in the purchase money and the expenses attending this business, which were considerable as the estate had been mortgaged to Lady Mary Stanley, and she was required to join in conveying. There was still after a further deficiency, for Mr. Wm Clayton (the attorney employed in this affair) brought in a second demand for expenses, which he said had been overlooked and forgotten, so that the feoffess were obliged to cut down some timber, and I, the Curate, gave up half a year's rent to discharge such further expenses. Thomas Lever, Carate.

The Rev. John Crowdson succeeded to the curacy of Hindley on the death of Mr. Thomas Lever. He died December 25th, 1810.

March 3rd, 1811.—The Rev. Edward Grime succeeded Mr. Crowdson, and in the same year, September 10th, vacated the curacy by accepting the living of Marcton Riggot, near Frome, in Someraetshire, in the gift of the Earl of Cork and Orrey. The Honourable and Rev. George Bridgeman, Rector of Wigan, 1811, September 11th, presented the Rev. George Henderick to this curacy who was licensed to the same October 3rd by Bonyer Edward Sparke, Lord Bishop of Chester.

[Some leaves have been here torn out and on the next following page there is written these Memorands.]

October 29th, 1830.—The Reverend George Henderick departed this life, and November 6th the Honourable and Rev. George Bridgeman, Rector of Wigan, presented the Reverend Edward Bill to this curacy, who was licenced to the same November 23rd by John Bird, Lord Bishop of Chester.

On obtaining possession of this book I discovered that some leaves had been abstracted immediately after the entry of the presentation of the Rev. George Henderick to this cursey, but by whom, or for what purpose I have not been able to ascertain.
